.A THOUGHT FROM A GREAT THEOLOGIAN AND BISHOP

"Time is a threefold present: the present as we experience it, the past as a present memory and the future as a present expectation."



As individuals and as a community, we need to find a better balance. We need to find time to work and time to play - time to be together, time to pray, time to support each other, time to rest, time to take action and time to stop.

We are consuming the earth's resources at such a breakneck speed that stopping and taking a break becomes a meaningful action. Restoring, repairing, rewilding and reusing become radical statements of resistance. In this way, we can challenge the mainstream belief that having more is the main point of our existence on earth. We can commit to healing and repairing and resting and restoring, and, in this way, we begin to recreate right relationships with God, our neighbour and the earth.

As the bishops remind us:

Care for the earth is fundamental to the universal good, since the health, wellbeing, and very survival of all life depends on a healthy environment. The full human development of every human person both now and in future generations cannot be separated from the fate of the earth. (The Call of Creation, 5)

REMEMBER, RETURN, REST AND RESTORE

In The Call of Creation, the bishops of England and Wales wrote:

We are following a way of life that disregards and damages God's creation, forces the poor into greater poverty, and threatens the right of future generations to a healthy environment and to their fair share of the earth's wealth and resources. This is contrary to the vision of the Gospel. (5)

This very strong statement - that we are following a way of life that is contrary to the vision of the Gospel - challenges us to respond urgently. Strangely, though, our response could be to do less rather than more!

As we celebrate this year's Season of Creation together, reflecting on our relationship with God, our neighbour, the earth and all other

living creatures, we can also take the time to look back. During the Season of Creation in 2020, we were invited to "remember, return, rest and restore".

These words have a very different feel to the way we normally live. I have the sense that we are in too much of a hurry - so we don't always take the time to "remember" and learn from the past. We have forgotten that everything has a season - not just fruits and vegetables but also humans. We try to maintain the same hectic rhythm all the time instead of taking time to reflect and to contemplate - to "return".

We have forgotten the value and importance

of "rest". It seems like an interruption rather than an opportunity. And perhaps we also forget that our relationships with each other and with the earth can be restored. We have the chance to "restore" the land itself and its climate so that we can live on together in peace.

The idea of contemplative rest sounds like a luxury to many of us. Perhaps you're a delivery driver racing around to drop off parcels, and your time is tracked. Maybe you work at a supermarket check-out, and every move you make is watched to make sure you're working at speed. Or you work in a call centre and must finish calls in a fixed time. If you are like many others, a day off simply becomes a day to complete other types of tasks: the washing, cleaning and shopping. Rest never makes it onto your never-ending list of things to do.

Yet for others, time stretches out and drags - another day to get through, a day of loneliness, a day without work or social interaction.

DIVINE OFFICE WEEK I

None of us has the right to deprive another of what they need to live. Yet, when we pollute the air or the water, we stop someone else from breathing clean air

or drinking fresh water. Climate breakdown, caused by human activity, creates food shortages and hunger. It leads to drought and floods, as well as intolerable levels of heat.



We can see the impact of rampant inequality in the climate crisis and the environmental degradation of the earth. It is always the poorest that experience the worst effects because they don't have the resources to protect themselves.

So, what should we do? As the bishops say in the Call of Creation, "We seek the intercession of St Francis of Assisi in the necessary action that must take place at every level in Church and society" (3).

They understand that a simple and sustainable lifestyle can be a source of joy. This lifestyle means loving others and caring about the beauty of God's creation. It means creating a common home where all of us can flourish and live in peace.

St Francis made the connection between love of nature, neighbour, God and peace. May we be inspired to follow his example.

SIMPLICITY AND JOY

This week sees the Feast of St Francis (4 October). In Laudato Si', Pope Francis tells us how much he is inspired by the life of this saint:

> I believe that Saint Francis is the example par excellence of care for the vulnerable and of an integral ecology lived out joyfully and authentically. He is the patron saint of all who study and work in the area of ecology, and he is also much loved by non-Christians. He was particularly concerned for God's creation and for the poor and outcast. He loved, and was deeply loved for his joy, his generous self-giving, his openheartedness... He shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace. (10)

These words remind us of the relationships we have reflected on during this ecumenical Season of Creation; our relationships with God, our neighbours and nature.

Sometimes it feels easy to despair at the state of the world, the challenges of the climate crisis, the loss of biodiversity and the extinction of species. But St Francis shows us that a life of authentic and open-hearted love brings joy, not despair and misery. He cared for other creatures, nature, social justice and peace.

We cannot have peace if we do not care for our neighbour or the earth. The race to hoard resources in the hands of a very few, leaving others hungry, leads us towards conflict and not peace. Such extreme levels of inequality are unjust.

Jesus offers a different way of living, completely at odds with the exploitation of nature and other people, as Pope Francis reminds us:

> When nature is viewed solely as a source of profit and gain, this has serious consequences for society. This vision of "might is right" has engendered immense inequality, injustice and acts of violence against the majority of humanity, since resources end up in the hands of the first comer or the most powerful: the winner takes all. Completely at odds with this model are the ideals of harmony, justice, fraternity and peace as proposed by Jesus. (Laudato Si', 82)

It is our urgent task to promote peace and to work for it. Peace is not brought about by capitulating to the powerful but by seeking the common good. The common good is the good of each and every one of us. Each of us is created and loved by God, or, as Pope Benedict XVI said in a homily, "Each of us is the result of a thought of God. Each of us is willed. Each of us is loved. Each of us is necessary."
