<u>REFLECTION:</u> 28th Sunday of Ordinary Time. "One of them turned back praising God" Luke 17 : 11-19

A woman in her nineties used to take a taxi to Mass every Sunday morning because she was no longer able to get to church unaided. Very often she got the same taxi driver and one Sunday he said to her, "Why do you bother coming to church every Sunday at your age?" She replied, "To say 'thankyou'. Just to say 'thank you'.



The story gives us a marvellous image of the loving relationship we have with God through Jesus. Jesus is ungrudging and bountiful in the gifts he offers. As John wrote in the Prologue to his Gospel: "Indeed, from his fullness we have, all of us, received" (John 1:16). This is demonstrated beautifully at the wedding feast when Jesus offers not a carafe of *vin ordinaire* but gallons of the finest vintage. With him there is always plenty.

MASTER OF THE CATHOLIC KINGS, THE WEDDING AT CANA

Completed around 1495 by an unidentified Spanish artist, celebrated as the Master of the Catholic Kings, this painting now hangs in the National Gallery of Art in Washington, DC. The artist's title is derived from his principal work, *The Altarpiece of the Catholic Kings*, of which this panel is a part. The whole piece was completed during the reign of the Catholic monarchs King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella.

THE WEDDING AT CANA

Running out of wine at a wedding feast is hardly a life-or-death situation: inconvenient and embarrassing, yes, but not an enduring calamity, except that the family's shame might eclipse other memories of the feast. In his Gospel, John chooses this troubled domestic scene to celebrate the story of Jesus' first great sign, one that reveals his glory and leads the disciples to believe in him.

The evangelist introduces the mother of Jesus first – he never calls her Mary. Like the beloved disciple in this Gospel, the mother of Jesus remains unnamed, perhaps emphasising their unique relationship to Jesus. John then tells us that Jesus and the disciples have also been invited. Perhaps this is the wedding of one of Mary's close relatives, which would naturally make her more sensitive to the distressing news that the couple have run out of wine. Mary simply informs Jesus of the situation without suggesting a remedy or asking him to do anything.

THE UNEXPECTED GIFT

Jesus' reply underlines the point that he cannot be bound by family relationships, but only by his Father's will: his mission has priority over the agenda of his kinsfolk. This is reminiscent of Luke's account of the twelve-year-old Jesus in the Temple who responds to his mother by saying: "Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?" (Luke 2:49). In the language of John the adult Jesus now says that his hour has not yet come. Undaunted by her son's reply, Mary instructs the servants to do whatever Jesus tells them. It seems strange for a guest to instruct the household servants; but if Mary is a close family relative, this would not be out of place.

Clearly Mary expects her son to rise to the occasion, believing that he can turn poverty into plenty.

While there is no wine, there is an abundance of water in six stone jars for the Jewish ritual of purification. Jesus decides to save this distressing situation and tells the servants to fill these to the brim; after doing this they discover that the water has been changed into wine – all one hundred and twenty gallons. When the steward tastes it, he compliments the bridegroom for keeping the best wine until last – an unusual practice for wedding feasts which could last for days.

before he can see the crops emerge. Like the growth of the kingdom of God, it all takes time. If we allow the seed to struggle to grow in us, we will also grow. Eventually the word of God and our own word might become one. That would be a harvest indeed.

VINCENT VAN GOGH. THE SOWER

Vincent Van Gogh's father and grandfather were both pastors. Vincent tried to follow in their footsteps by teaching Bible classes and preaching, which he did in Isleworth, England. He then studied for the ministry in a

seminary near Brussels but failed to be recommended. By 1887 he had made a dramatic shift in his life, discovering that he could express his profound love for Christ and those who worked the land through his painting.

Vincent, who preferred to be known by his first name, had a particular love for the parables and their pictorial power. The motif of a peasant sowing fascinated him and he was fond of Jean-Francois Millet's treatment, although he thought it lacked colour. In 1888, after settling in Arles in the south of France and two years before his death, he painted a landscape with a sower, dominated by a huge sun, one that acts as a halo for the working farmer.

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE KINGDOM OF GOD

At the heart of the Gospel lies Jesus' preaching on the kingdom of God. Throughout his ministry, when Jesus speaks about the kingdom he never defines what it actually is, but offers stories and metaphors that attempt to catch something of what it is like: "The kingdom is like a... " Thus the parable is the privileged way Jesus uses to speak of different aspects of the kingdom of God.



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Among those parables is that of the sower, in which Jesus reflects on the word that is offered to others and depends on their response. This word is like a seed that is sown by Jesus, a seed that depends on the condition of the ground if it is to grow and bear fruit. Through different types of hearers, the parable explores a variety of responses.

THE SEED THAT STRUGGLES TO GROW


There is the hard-hearted crowd: no matter what they are offered, it is never enough to penetrate their granite exterior. The gift of the Gospel is left abandoned, like litter on the ground. There is the opposite crowd - the enthusiasts - who welcome every novelty

that comes, who embrace every fashionable movement. Sadly, they have no depth to them so nothing takes root. Then there is the legion of worriers: although they hear the word, they are always somewhere else in their head, wrestling with their own tragic thinking. These people prefer calamity to words of Good News; they are in love with catastrophe.

Finally, there are the calm people who respect language, those who make space in their life to hear what words mean. These people welcome the word into their heart and make it their own, so that it becomes a very part of their being: when they speak, the new word is a part of their story. The word becomes flesh in them.

These hearers are the model for true Christian discipleship: they give the word of God a secure place in their heart, and their willing collaboration ensures that this word becomes an event in the Christian life.

Today the word of God is still scattered generously, with throwaway style. God still risks God's word, hoping we will welcome it and make it our own. Like all seeds, the word of God takes time to grow. The sower knows that he has to wait for the weather, the secret workings of the soil, the slow thrust of life,
