#### REFLECTION - Second Sunday of Advent: "Prepare a way for the Lord"

Most of us are not prophets or preachers as John the Baptist was, but each of us can seek to do as the Baptist demands. Through repentance we can rediscover the mercy of God. Through sorrow for our sinful ways, a sorrow that is eager to put right what we have disrupted, we can make straight the way of the Lord. The best way to judge ourselves is not by what rules we do or do not keep, but by the fruits of the Spirit growing within us.



see his creatures dissolve, get lost, crumble. He goes out of his way to save us, restore our integrity and our beauty. If there is a fire that Jesus brings, it is that of the Holy Spirit: not a fire that burns and devours us, but a fire poured into our hearts to transform them from stone into flesh. The Holy Spirit is not a destructive fire, but the fire of love that warms hearts.

When we cry out for revenge, are tempted to complain at the Lord for his inertia, let us remember that what we need most from him is this patience. Let us remember that the weapons with which the Lord has chosen to fight evil are not axe, fire, revenge or punishment, but patience, exhortation, example, forgiveness and the cross. Evil is overcome by forgiving those who harm us and praying for our enemies, that the Lord might not impute evil to them, but rather change their hearts. This we should be mindful of in this time of Advent; if we want to recognise the Lord who comes we must learn to forgive, not to return evil for evil, and to pray for those who harm us.

## THE GOOD FARMER

Even though he is the greatest of all prophets, the closest to the Messiah, John the Baptist is confused by the way Jesus behaves. This John, who had prophesied in his mother's womb, prepared the Lord's immediate coming, made him known to the world, does not understand. This is how the Messiah should behave according to him: he should be "the axe... lying at the root of the trees; every tree... that does not bear good fruit is cut down" (Luke 3:9), or he should come with a "winnowing-fork... in his hand, and he will clear his threshing-floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire" (Matthew 3:12). Instead, Jesus acts in the exact opposite way. He describes his "style" through the parable of the good farmer: to the master who wants to cut down the tree that brings no fruit,

the gardener - that is, Jesus - replies, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig round it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down" (Luke 13:8-9). Far from bringing an axe with him, Jesus comes with a hoe and fertiliser: he does not come to cut down but to heal and make us grow, not to judge and condemn, but to comfort and restore.

John is like so many of us who, in the face of the injustices of the world, of evil, of those who sin undisturbed, who act unjustly, expect the Lord to inflict punishment, wish for the axe that cuts or the fire that purifies. We are all too ready to judge and accuse. The Old Testament seems to corroborate John's approach: "he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked" (Isaiah 11:4). We, too, feel entitled sometimes to ask the Lord to act decisively against evil at last.

Instead, the Lord continues to postpone the moment of retribution and punishment and confines himself to repeating ceaselessly: "Repent!" The Gospel, the Good News, is this: the Lord has decided to have patience with us, to give us more time, invite us to conversion, because he does not find any joy or satisfaction in death or punishment. He created us for life and does not want to

blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them" (Matthew 11:4-5). We might think that this answer means: "Go and report to John the miracles I perform." In reality, what Jesus is saying to John is this: "Go and tell John that finally people are able to see, to listen, to hear the call of the Father - people who, when they see me, see the Father through me, have faith in me, follow me. And those who follow me are not the righteous, but the most unexpected of all people: the lame, the deaf, even the dead! And prostitutes, tax collectors, public sinners!"

If Jesus had to answer this same question today, he might say this: "Come to any parish and see the people gathered to listen to the word, to eat the bread of life - come and witness the miracles of conversion and of faith, meet these people who see the invisible." We take faith for granted, do not realise what miracle it represents and the change it implies in a person's life. What Jesus is really saying to John, then, and to us today is that, ves, he is the Messiah, that God's decisive intervention in history is indeed happening: the Lord is present, is near, acts in his Church and beyond the Church; seeds of his grace are active everywhere in the world.

We should not be fooled by appearances. The evidence of the Lord's presence and action in the world is our own faith and the way it inspires us to behave, and to be more forgiving and loving in our lives.

## A QUESTION OF FAITH


From his prison, as a last act before his impending execution, John the Baptist sends some of his disciples to ask Jesus a puzzling question: "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" (Matthew 11:3). How can such a question come from the greatest of all prophets, from the very person who had recognised in Jesus the Messiah when he had stated: "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29), and had invited his disciples to leave him to follow Jesus? Who more than John should have known the answer to the question he asks Jesus? In all likelihood, John the Baptist's question to Jesus does not express a doubt but is a way of prodding Jesus, of telling him: "If you are the Messiah, act like a Messiah, behave like a Messiah!"

God with us

John the Baptist had his own idea of how Jesus should have fulfilled his mission. He advocated for a strong Messiah, who should eliminate evil with axe, winnowing-fork and fire (Matthew 3:7-12). John was finding Jesus too weak. They had contrasting styles. John was dressed in camel skins; Jesus like everyone else. John ate honey and grasshoppers; Jesus dined at the houses of tax collectors and sinners and took part in wedding banquets. John thought that justice should be restored with



For a while John manages to contain his surprise, perhaps his disappointment. Maybe he thinks that this is a provisional tactic on Jesus' part, and that the axe and the fire will eventually be deployed. At the moment in which his relentless denunciation of injustice is about to cause his death, however, John is not able to countenance Jesus' attitude any longer.

Jesus' response betrays the understanding that exists between him and John. It is an encrypted answer, unintelligible to those who report it but not to its recipient. He sends the disciples back with these words: "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the 11 DECEMBER 2022
