Before the session

Scripture reading

Reminder of approach and protocols for discussions

Our sessions use the 'encounter-listen-discern' model. The purpose of the discussions is to listen to each other's experiences and reflections, with the aim of hearing the voice of the Holy Spirit.

The following protocols are designed to help us use this model effectively:

- There are no right or wrong answers.
- Don't feel you need to answer all the questions – focus on those that are most meaningful to you.
- Be yourself - talk from the heart about your personal experiences.
- Encourage each other (even if you don't always agree).
- Don't be afraid of silence.
- Respect each other.
- Keep discussions confidential within the group.
- Everyone's voice needs to be heard.
- Listen actively – allow yourself to be challenged, surprised, or even shocked.

Discussion 8 - Authority and Participation

The first discussion today is about how we are supported to participate in the mission of the Church. The questions are:

- How is authority exercised in our communities?
- How do we preach the Gospel?
- How does our parish community bring people closer to Christ?
- What groups or courses are available? What initiatives are in place?
- What are the fruits of this collaboration, and what are the obstacles and challenges?

Discussion 9 - Discerning and Deciding

The next discussion is about the Church makes decisions. The questions are:

- How do we discern together the direction in which the Holy Spirit is leading us?
- Is there freedom to exercise my particular gifts in the Church, and participate in this common work of discernment and decision making?
- Is my parish community accountable and transparent in decision making? What can help improve this?
- Do I support the Bishops and the Priests in arriving at their decisions?

Discussion 10 - Forming ourselves in Synodality

The final questions look forward, to how we can make this Synod the start of a new way of working within the Church. The questions are:

- What additional formation do I need to be a missionary disciple?
- Is the local community effective in catechising and passing on the faith?
- What tools are necessary for the Church to be truly synodal, listening and journeying together?
- How do we continue the listening and dialogue beyond this process so that the Church have a 'lived synodality' as the Holy Father asks?

What next?

The final discussion topic reminds us that this is a Synod about synodality itself. A key aim of the process is to transform the way the Church works and makes decisions. The discussions that you have been involved in need to continue and be extended.

The outcomes of your discussions will be used to inform a response to the Synod Office in Rome on behalf of the parish. The response will also be copied to the diocese though it will not meet the cut off point for the diocesan presentation by Bishop Richard next week. His presentation will take the form of a webinar (online presentation) at 7:30pm on Wednesday 9th March.
